Recent Fabricated Metal Locations in Georgia

Over the last five years, fabricated metal companies have continued to grow and expand in Georgia. Here are a few recent examples of companies now calling Georgia home.

Home Manufacturer ADMARES to Create Over 1,400 Jobs in Ware County

In May 2023, Governor Brian P. Kemp announced that ADMARES, which specializes in industrialized manufacturing of buildings and homes, plans to construct its first U.S. manufacturing facility in Waycross, Georgia. The company expects to create over 1,400 new jobs and invest \$750 million in Ware County.

"In addition to exploring opportunities in other states, Waycross, Georgia, is an ideal location for a transportation hub with easy access to major highways and extensive rail connections. Its proximity to the Port of Brunswick, one of the busiest ports on the eastern seaboard, offers a competitive advantage for global trade. Waycross' strategic location and robust infrastructure make it an attractive destination for us in the region."

Copper Foil Manufacturer Denkai America to Locate New Manufacturing Facility, North American Headquarters in Richmond County

The company's initial investment will be \$150 million to establish an electrodeposited copper foil production facility, with a focus on electric vehicle battery foil, on a 115-acre site, with a goal to invest a total of \$430 million and create 250 new jobs over the next five years.


Industry Snapshot






Quality Talent for Less

Georgia is known for its high-quality affordable workforce. Wage rates in the state typically fall below the national average, particularly in manufacturing occupations. The state's fabricated metal manufacturing wages are no exception.

- Projected growth of 18% in fabricated metal manufacturing industry employment over the next decade compared to 5% nationally
- Median hourly earnings of \$18.56 compared to \$21.10 nationally (based on top 21 fabricated metal staffing pattern occupations)

Fabricated Metal Manufacturing Wage Comparison, Georgia vs. the U.S.





People and Support Needed to Succeed

Georgia's high concentration of degree-seeking students and top-tier colleges and universities make the state one of the country's richest in top-level talent. These institutions also offer companies access to cutting-edge research and development partnerships.

- Since 2012, there has been a 7% increase in the number of graduates skilled in supporting Georgia's fabricated metal manufacturing operations.
- Georgia Tech ranks 2nd for engineering R&D funding nationally and has benefited from a 79% uptick in engineering R&D funding since 2012.
